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neing raised in a Christian Home, I was privileged to learn Labout Christ in an environment that made it very easy for me to accept the simple truths of Christ and God's Word. My dad was very instrumental in my spiritual journey. He was the one who encouraged me to attend Sunday school and church activities. He taught us how to pray and he always scheduled family prayer meetings. As an obedient son to my father, I always complied even if at times I felt disinterested. I was in high school and wondered what I was to do with my life. Surely, there was more to life than just getting up each day and going through the motions. I didn't have a purpose in life.

Guide your children toward what is right and good.

Discipline was an important way and method my dad showed his love. He was strict, but what I admired about him is how he was always calm and loving in guiding us to always choose what is right and good. He was never harsh and was always careful in disciplining us.

Boldly claim your family for God.
My dad would always say in
Ilocano, "Isuna laeng met ti
pagkamangan tayo", meaning,
God alone is our shelter.
Whatever problems we had
then as a family, my dad would

always affirm and declare God's protection, provision, and presence for the whole family.

Recognize that fatherhood is by the grace of God.

My dad was not perfect: no one is. But despite his imperfections, the grace of God was very evident in his life. No matter the challenges we faced as a family, God was not ignorant of the fact that my dad needed help. God knows our limits. And that's when He says to us "Come to me, and will give you my strength and power. I will do what you cannot do on your own." When we feel down and exhausted, God's grace flows to us and through us. When we have had enough and want to throw in the towel, God's loving arms are outstretched, ready to catch us when we fall. When the demand of parenting overwhelms us, God's grace carries us through.
